

Sundog Solar to present at SPOG

Marvin and Barb Jackson head up the base operations at Sundog Solar. Marvin grew up on a family dairy and beef operation in Sundre, Alberta. He attended Olds College receiving a degree in Business finance and Livestock production. He and his wife Barb, raise beef cattle and quarter horses with their two daughters. A fourth generation in Canadian Agriculture, Marvin quickly realized the benefits in remote solar watering and energizers for rotational grazing at the farm level. In the spring of 2000, Sundog Solar and Agriculture Supplies was opened which quickly expanded into winter watering systems, transfer systems and portable solar and wind powered pumping designs.

Sundog Solar has been fortunate enough to design and supply watering systems for many conservation groups as well as farmers across North America. Some of their custom designed oilfield projects have ventured as far as Kazakhstan, Iraq and Malaysia, as well as some large assembled solar array's which have been shipped as complete units on ice roads to remote areas of northern Alberta.

Sundog Solar began mainly as an agriculture based business but has proudly expanded to cover many industries in Alberta and surrounding areas.

CAPP's view on the Alberta Royalty Review



JANUARY 29, 2016 - CALGARY, ALBERTA

The Alberta royalty review has led to a balanced report that sets the stage for more work between industry and government to ensure Alberta's oil and gas sector is competitive in North America to attract investment and create more jobs and value for Albertans, the Canadian Association of Petroleum Producers (CAPP) said today.

"The new royalty framework is principle-based and provides a foundation to build the predictability industry needs for future investment," said Tim McMillan, CAPP's president and chief executive officer.

"The report recognizes royalties are just one part of the competitiveness equation for Alberta. With today's economic situation, now is the time for industry and the Alberta government to work together on solutions that will make Alberta a world-class province to do business."

"Today's announcement has been the result of a fair and credible process, one Albertans can trust," McMillan said.

The royalty panel produced a detailed, 200-page report over its five-month review.

The biggest benefit either stakeholder sees from their involvement in SPOG, un-


