## Eagle Hill Community

Eagle Hill, founded in **1905**, is within Mountain View County and is the highest point between Calgary and Edmonton. Farming has always been the backbone and heartbeat of this community.



Together the community has done a great deal. The Vale View School was built in **1909** and burned down in 1957 and was never rebuilt. In **1934** the first Eagle Hill Co-op was built by local farmers. In **1977** the new store was built. In **1943** the Eagle Hill and District Savings and Credit Union was organized by the locals because the banks did not lend money to farmers. In **2009**, the bank was closed and all accounts moved to the Mountain View Credit Union.

In **1946**, the first 4H beef club was organized with only 4 calves showing that year. It has now become the Eagle Hill & Multi 4H Club.

In **1947**, the Co-op Curling club built a one sheet curling rink. The next year they added a second sheet.

In **1905**, the present 2 sheet curling rink was built.

The hall was built in the fall of **1949**. It was named memorial hall in memory of people serving in the

armed forces from the community. The opening dance on Dec. 16, 1949 had admission of \$1 for a man and .50\$ for a women.. unless she brought a cake...then she was free. On October 30, **2005** the Eagle Hill Memorial Hall burnt to the ground. The Grand Opening of the new hall was on October 24, **2009**. It houses many community activities such as weddings, community suppers, a seniors club, a quilting group and activities for children.

Eagle Hill has two busy ball diamonds that are booked throughout the summer.

SPOG salutes the Eagle Hill Community which is an excellent example of people coming together to find common solutions.

# TransCanada

## Sundre Pipeline Proposed Upgrade Project

**T**ransCanada is planning to replacing pipes in the project area. Upgrade portions of the existing 36-inch Western Alberta System Mainline natural gas pipeline at the west end of Sundre. This upgrade is necessary to ensure the pipeline continues to meet the needs of the area's growing population. A 570-metre section of the pipeline will be replaced with greater wall thickness to ensure continued public safety and reliable service in the future. Natural gas service for the Town of Sundre is not expected to be impacted during the project. TransCanada will be excavating and

Upgrading pipe that runs underneath Highway 27 will consist of removing the existing 36-inch pipe from the 42-inch casing then inserting the new 36-inch pipe through the casing with minimal disruption on the highway. Consultation and environmental assessments will be Oct.-May. The application will be submitted to the National Energy Board in March. Pipeline construction is slated to be from June - September. The Final Clean-up activities will end in the summer of 2016. For more information contact Patricia Poulton 403 831-0405.

**Clearwater County places road bans on certain surfaced roads in order to protect infrastructure and manage road use. Weight restrictions are applied due to seasonal conditions such as the spring thaw and help preserve the life span of the County's paved structures. Gravel roads remain ban free until damages start to appear in which case movement on dry frozen track only is implemented. The County has a permitting system and staff in place to monitor and reroute heavy hauls around weak or sensitive areas.
